CRASH COURSE Podcasting with Maria Shilaos Nelson

COMM 4670 has been designed to help students find their own voice by telling audio stories about things of which they are passionate. It teaches them how to ethically use the rapidly growing platform of podcasting as a means to deliver directly to a consumer's cellphone important and relevant information.

Students analyze podcast story structure and learn how to pitch and collaborate on audio stories. Over the course of the semester, they work with a team to develop four group podcasts that are later published by the College of Humanities on the Humanities Radio website. They also create the first episode of their own personal podcast. In the process, they learn research and interview techniques, script writing, recording and editing of audio content. But most importantly, they experience the joy of publishing relevant and compelling stories and interviews.

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The course also exposes them to the realties that come with the business of podcasting and shows them what they need to know to be successful. They learn the value of creating a unique podcast with a clearly defined purpose and audience. They also learn the importance of connecting with that audience by creating unique social media posts on several platforms.

The course allows students to engage with the community by interviewing experts and members of the community on important topics. It also allows the community to see those issues from the perspective of students.

This course is unique because it creates an immersive environment that gives students an opportunity to apply the theory and ethics, they're learning in the classroom, to their on published material. This course is all about innovation and finding new ways to tell stories in the rapidly changing podcasting environment.

I hope students in this course find the joy that I have found in my career of audio storytelling. It is fulfilling to tell a story that uses wonderful natural sounds to emotionally immerse a listener into the subject. Afterall, there's nothing better than the picture painted by our own imaginations.
